WHY ARE SPEECH AND LANGUAGE SO IMPORTANT?



Speech and language skills are absolutely fundamental to our wellbeing and success in life. We use these skills constantly to communicate our wants and needs to others, to collaborate and negotiate, and to build strong bonds with other people. Language skills are also important for our learning. In schools and at home, we learn new skills and acquire new knowledge by listening to others talking and reading written language. The demands on language skills only increase as children get older and progress through their education.

It's often easy to identify children who have difficulties with unclear speech, as you will find it difficult to understand their talking, and your child may be frustrated when their speech is not understood. Language, on the other hand, can be a hidden difficulty which is harder to identify as we often can't observe whether someone has or hasn't understood.

SHOULD I BE CONCERNED?

If you have any concerns about your child's speech or language skills we strongly encourage you to discuss your concerns with your child's school (their class teacher and/or SENCo), as they know your child well and will be able to talk to you about the resources and services which are available to you locally.

Parents do not cause speech and language difficulties, but you can help children to resolve difficulties and build good speech and language skills by adapting the way you communicate and by practising key skills with your children at home. We've put together the information, resources and activities on this website to help you work with your children at home to boost their speech and language skills, and we'll be adding to it as we produce new content and resources for you to use at home, so keep checking back to make sure you don't miss out!



Parents can learn more about why speech and language skills are important and why they can impact on a child's learning in the Information tab. This is a good place for parents to start, especially if they have concerns about their child's development or progress with their speech and language.

We have broken down different areas of speech and language skills into plain English - without the jargon - to help teachers and families communicate about a child's needs more clearly. Here is where you can find specific advice about how to unpick children's speech and language needs and what parents can do next if they are concerned.

DEVELOPMENT

We have put together lots of information about what parents can expect from their child's development at different ages. This can sometimes be overwhelming, so to make this information accessible, we've broken it down according to different communication skills: Listening and Attention, Understanding, Talking, and Speech. Clear statements and examples will help parents to recognise what level their child is currently working at. It's useful for staff at school too! This is a really important step for determining what types of activities are appropriate for the child to be working on home.

This is where you will find our treasure trove of speech and language resources which you can share with parents. There's lots to find here, so it can be a good idea to highlight key activities which are relevant for a child to their parents – this extra step will help parents know that they're on the right track with their interventions at home. You will find a selection of speech activities, online interactive listening games, and language activities which are appropriate for children from EYFS up to KS3. To help you direct parents to the right activities for their child, we've colour-coded our language activities to match the ages and stages in our developmental tables.

LANGUAGE ACTIVITIES

We have put together lots of games and activities for you to use with your child at home to encourage their understanding and talking. We have divided this section into colour bands to show you the stage of development the activity is encouraging. Use our developmental tables to see what the next steps are for your child and then use the language activities to encourage the development of those skills. For example, if your child's next language steps were in the green band on the development chart then choose from the green language activities.

Red - Up to 1½	>
Orange - Up to 2	>
Yellow - Up to 2½	>
Green - Up to 3	>
Light Blue - Up to 4	>

INTERACTIVE GAMES

These games are to help develop your child's ability to tell the difference between sounds and work out where sounds are in words. Both these skills are important for speaking as well as reading.

There are five different levels:

- Pinata Island** - Helps listen for single sounds
- Circus** - Helps identify sounds in single words
- Haunted House** - Helps discriminate between socially unfamiliar words
- Racing** - Helps identify sounds at the beginning
- Submarine** - Helps identify sounds at beginning and ends of words

Because it can be more difficult to engage children when they are at home, we've also got some suggestions for how to adapt everyday activities so that working on speech and language can be slotted in throughout the day.

EVERYDAY ACTIVITIES

The best way to encourage your child's speech and language development is to do lots of talking and listening together. There is no need to have special tasks or extra time in the day to do this, it is always good to talk. This is why everyday activities like mealtimes, having a bath and even household chores, such as organising the washing, are perfect for developing your child's speech and language skills. By using everyday activities, you can talk about events and situations that are very familiar to your child and enables them to practice the language skills that they have already learned and to build on these skills.

Almost any daily event can be used, there are some ideas below to get you started.

Our tips for success with supporting parents:

- Use the development tables to help parents understand more about their child's skills and reasonable expectations. You can use your knowledge of the child and their parents' feedback to locate the level that the child is currently working at on the development tables. Then, direct parents towards the appropriate colour band for the child's language level.
- Lots of parents can feel that they do not have the knowledge and skills to work on production of speech sounds at home. The guidance for parents in our 'Information' tab will help parents to feel more confident in this area. Our structured speech activities and online, interactive games focus on listening to speech sounds, which is a fundamental skill for speech development and an easy way for parents to support speech development at home with little experience.
- Because our speech activities focus on listening, these activities will also be useful for children who are learning to read and write. Developing a child's listening and sound processing (also called phonological awareness) skills provides a crucial foundation for developing their literacy skills.
- Many parents will find it difficult to allocate time for dedicated speech and language activities or may have difficulty finding and/or printing the resources they need. We have created advice sheets and videos to support parents with developing speech and language skills through everyday activities at home without the need for anything extra.
- Our blog has lots of quick-read articles which can build parents' confidence and offer inspiration for things to do with their children at home.
